EPA's SBIR Phase 1 Solicitation to Open June 2020

EPA's 2020-2021 SBIR Phase I solicitation, to support eligible small businesses in the development and commercialization of innovative environmental technologies, is expected to open in late June 2020. EPA

is one of 11 federal agencies that participate in the SBIR Program. Phase I awards are for up to \$100,000 to demonstrate proof of concept in one of the <u>SBIR solicitation topic areas</u>. Successful Phase I awardees are eligible to receive Phase II funding, up to \$400,000 for two years.

Waste Reduction for the Hospitality Industry

Tips to decrease your waste volume and lower your disposal costs

Businesses are reopening and summer is starting. This is good for the hospitality industry but in the face of COVID-19, many challenges remain. One such challenge is the amount of trash generated. You may realize the waste stream at your business, whether it is a large hotel or a single Airbnb, is increasing. New items such as single use gloves and masks will increase the waste generated not only from your own operations but from guests as well.

Now is the time to embrace the waste reduction initiatives you may have started or think about beginning a waste reduction initiative. Here are some tips to incorporate in your operations to minimize certain types of waste, thereby decreasing overall waste volume and lowering waste costs.

• **Paper** – Limit the use of printed items by sending folios, receipts, and terms of service via email, text or digital apps. Not only will you save money on paper purchases and decrease your waste, you can stay in touch with guests throughout their stay.

- Single Use Items Consider installing amenity dispensers in guest rooms. This eliminates the
 waste of single visit items such as shampoo and allows the property to save money on buying
 bulk refillable products.
- Single Use Linen Bags Instead of packaging clean linens in plastic bags, consider investing in cloth washable bags that stay with guest room linens. The clean linens can be transported in clean bags reducing exposure. Once the linens are gathered after a guest leaves, the dirty linens can be put into that same bag and transported to the laundry where both bag and linens are washed.
- Recyclables Don't stop recycling! Your cardboard boxes and other recyclables are another company's raw materials for shipping and packaging. Ensuring that only clean and empty materials go in recycle bins can reduce your waste hauling costs and help recover valuable materials. If you don't already provide them, consider adding containers for guests to recycle in their rooms or designated areas.
