Proposed Phase-Down of Methylene Chloride Public Comment Due by July 3rd

Methylene chloride is widely used in many industries for paint removing, degreasing, cleaning, manufacturing, and more. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is proposing a rapid phase-down for its use. The [proposed rule](#) would:

- Prohibit manufacturing, processing and distribution of methylene chloride for all consumer uses
- Prohibit most industrial and commercial uses of methylene chloride
- Create strict workplace protections to ensure that for the remaining uses, workers will not be harmed by methylene chloride use.
- Require manufacturers (including importers), processors, and distributors to notify companies to whom methylene chloride is shipped of the prohibitions and to maintain records.

Proposed Reforms to New Chemical Review Process Under TSCA Public Comment Due by July 25th

The EPA proposed amendments to regulations that govern the review of new chemicals under the Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA).

These amendments would update the regulations to:

- Include the five statutory determinations EPA must make for each new chemical submission;
- Eliminate eligibility exemptions from the full safety review process for PFAS and other persistent, bioaccumulative, and toxic chemicals; and
- Make the new chemicals review process more efficient, including clarifying the level of detail needed in new chemical notices and amending the procedures for EPA's review of notices that have errors or are incomplete.

Washoe County's Draft Ozone Wildfire Mitigation Plan Public Comment Due by July 28th

The Washoe County Health District's Air Quality Management Division (AQMD) has issued a call for public comment on its [draft Ozone Wildfire Mitigation Plan](#). The plan outlines AQMD's strategies to address high levels of ozone resulting from wildfires and is a requirement by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The 2023 draft plan, open for public input until July 28, 2023, mirrors the previously established Wildfire Mitigation Plan for Particulate Matter (PM) but focuses specifically on ozone. The plan covers various aspects, including the impact of wildfires on Washoe County's ozone levels, public notification procedures, and the implementation of mitigation measures.

EPA Proposes Ban on Perchloroethylene (PCE) Public Webinar July 19th Public Comment Due by August 15th

What is the Proposed Rule?

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has [proposed a rule](#) which bans most uses of perchloroethylene (PCE), a chemical commonly used in brake cleaners, adhesives, dry cleaning, and various industrial settings. The ban would apply to consumer uses but allow many industrial and commercial uses to continue under strict workplace controls. Key exceptions include uses related to national security, aviation, critical infrastructure, and efforts to combat climate change.

The ban would phase out most consumer uses and many industrial and commercial uses within 24 months. Businesses such as commercial screen printers, petroleum manufacturing, soap and detergent manufacturers, and synthetic rubber makers may be affected by this proposed ban.

What About Dry Cleaners?

While many dry cleaners have already started to phase out the use of PCE, many are still heavily reliant on the chemical. As part of the PCE ban, dry cleaning with PCE would undergo a 10-year phaseout, providing time to transition to alternative methods. This will likely include buying new equipment and sourcing new chemicals to replace PCE. President Biden's budget proposal includes some funding for pollution prevention which may help offset these costs.

- Reduce pollution during plastic production
- Improve post-use materials management
- Prevent trash and micro/nanoplastics from entering waterways and remove escaped trash from the environment


